

MISCELLANEOUS SAFETY TIPS

- ATVs should only be driven by someone who is large enough to handle the machine and has passed an ATV safety course. All riders should wear helmets.
- "Roughen" potentially slippery areas (like milking parlor steps) to prevent falls.
- Keep all chemicals in a locked area and make sure the storage area is away from animal feed, seeds, and living quarters.

PLAY IT SAFE ON THE FARM

FARM SAFETY IS IMPORTANT BECAUSE YOUR FAMILY'S SAFETY IS IMPORTANT.

Farm safety takes some thought and energy — but consider what you have to lose!

CHILD SAFETY

Never let children play on farm equipment and establish a “no extra rider” rule for all farm machinery. Each year, thousands of kids are injured on family farms.

EQUIPMENT SAFETY

- Before using a tractor, perform a complete safety check.
- PTO equipment should be properly shielded.
- All tractors should have rollover protection structures (ROPS) and riders should wear a seatbelt.
- Properly shield portable auger intakes.
- Never hitch a load higher than the tractor drawbar and use weights to increase tractor stability.

FIREPROOFING YOUR FARM

- Place fire extinguishers in your home and farm buildings and on your tractors and combines.
- Inspect your electrical wiring to avoid dangerously frayed or exposed wiring.
- Store flammable liquids at least 40 feet from buildings.
- Invite the fire department to your farm to inspect the buildings and create a plan in case of fire.
- Equip all major buildings with UL approved lightning protection systems and surge arrestors.

CHEMICAL SAFETY CHECKLIST

- Store all poisons in their original containers with labels intact and properly dispose of empty containers.
- Keep all chemicals in a locked area to prevent entry by children or animals. Make sure the storage area is away from animal feed, seeds, and living quarters.
- Workers should use appropriate personal protective equipment, such as chemical-resistant gloves, aprons, safety goggles, respirators, hard hats, and other protective gear when needed.
- Read labels thoroughly before opening a chemical container.
